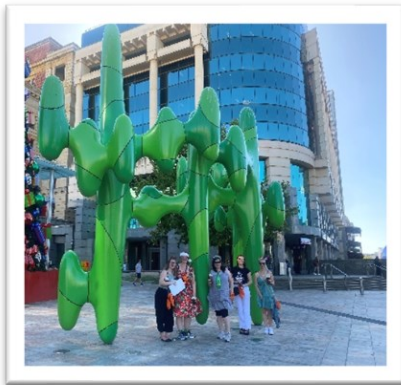


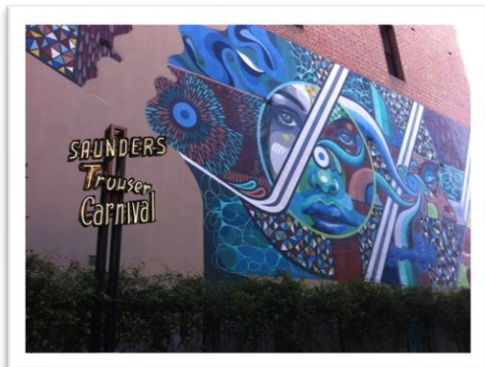
Perth CBD Public Art Scavenger Hunt

The artwork near the Globe Hotel is by Beastman and Vans the Omega.

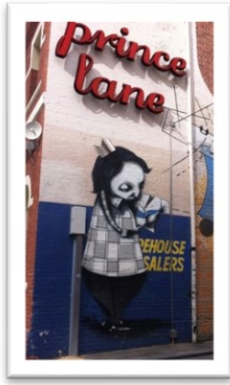

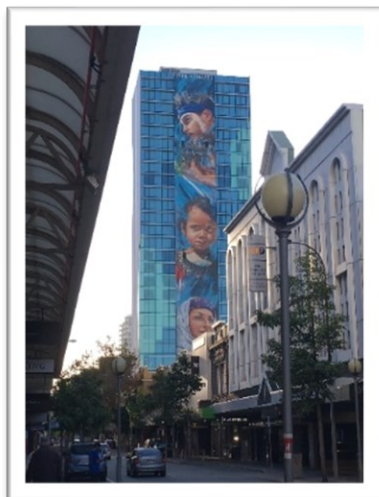

The tallest artwork in the Southern hemisphere, at 27-storesys high were painted by Matt Adnate and depict the faces of Indigenous people.

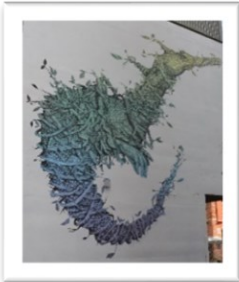

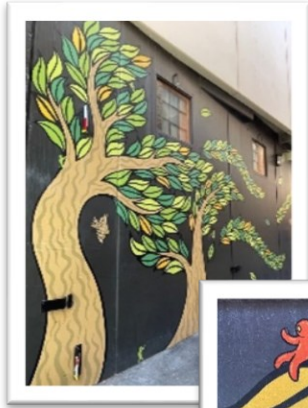


This art is titled 'Waargyl', by Lance Chadd and Trish Robinson, tells of Aboriginal spirituality and Boorongur lore, connection and care for country.

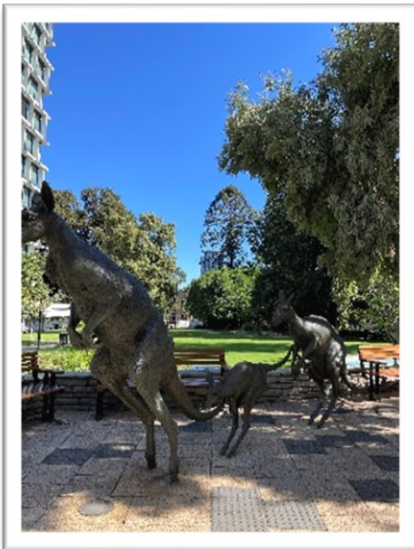


The Plaza Arcade artwork is by Robert Jenkins aka Black Mountains Art.

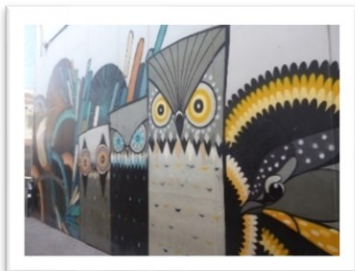


These little guys are the artist's signature touch and can be seen in all of his art.
